### Meet Dewey Andrew

CarePartners Foundation Board Member, Business Leader and Basketball Pioneer

Imagine you are in Ravenna, Italy, on a bus with your basketball teammates. Your team has just won against the home team, and the Ravenna fans are not happy about it. They are so unhappy, in fact, that they surround your bus, shouting and throwing rocks, a few of which break windows. Your bus driver skillfully pulls out of town to evade the marauding crowd, and you are on your way back to your home, Bologna.

If you're Dewey Andrew, CarePartners Foundation Board member, you don't have to imagine this exhilarating scene. You can just think back to 1966, shortly after you arrived in Italy to play professional basketball. Dewey played for Bologna's Cassera Fortitudo from 1966-1968, having played basketball



first non-Italian to play

since age five.

In college,
Dewey played for
Elon University.
Upon graduation, he
coached at the high
school and college
levels, including
for Elon and UNC
Chapel Hill. It was
while coaching
and teaching math
at Elon that his
friend, Doug Moe,
recommended Dewey
look to Europe

for a chance at playing basketball professionally. Italy had just begun accepting one American player per team, and Dewey jumped at the opportunity to be one of those Americans. He became the first American to play for Bologna, and he and Doug Moe were the top two players in Italy during those years. Dewey's wife and one-year-old son joined him in Italy soon after his arrival. They had a wonderful time there, learning Italian and enjoying the exquisite food. Dewey notes that the fans were passionate and devoted and treated him like a king when he was at the top of his game.

Dewey's son, Scott, had always wanted to return to Italy to see where he had spent the earliest years of his life. This year that wish came true, as Dewey and his wife, Susan, joined Scott and his wife, Daphne, for a trip back to Italy. What they got was a reception they never

expected. When Scott was making the hotel reservations in Bologna, he mentioned to the general manager that his father had played basketball back in the 60s. Unbeknownst to Scott or Dewey, this prompted the general manager to get in touch with the current Fortitudo team. This set off a chain of events leading to a reunion with a former teammate, and coverage of Dewey's return in three Italian newspapers. Dewey hadn't thought anyone would remember him, but instead he was welcomed back like a returning hero!

In the years between his return to the United States in 1968 and his trip back to Italy in 2013, Dewey became a business leader and a prominent member of the Western North Carolina community. He owned Smoky Mountain Distributors for thirty years, was a sports official

Dewey credits his time in Europe with helping him make the contacts that he later used to build the import side of his beverage distribution business. Through Smoky Mountain Distributors, Dewey developed relationships with people from many Western North Carolina nonprofit organizations. He became involved with several boards, including the Mountain Area Hospice Foundation Board, and later the CarePartners Foundation Board, which he serves on to this day. Dewey likes to stay busy and involved in the community.

Dewey and his wife, Susan, are major supporters of CarePartners Foundation. Their names are familiar to anyone who has spent time at CarePartners Rehabilitation Hospital, as their names and picture are attached to the hospital's Andrew Therapy Pavilion. As Dewey says, "Western North Carolina was very good to me, and we were looking for a way to give back. When the community has been good to you, you want to be good to the community."

She has stitched her love of quilts, her love
